As work continues on the Printz/Powell Colony House project, we'll be announcing ways for you and other interested folks to become more involved.



Thank you, Karen, for always stepping up to make things happen at the Park, and for being such a kind, caring person!


CHRISTMAS IN JULY!


On Friday, July 26, we had unexpected visitors. They brought two carloads of artwork for our museum. Beautiful paintings and a sculptured bust of a small child.



Pioneer Perspective
A Pioneer Speaks by R.E. Harrington, from
Enterprise – Sun & News, Wednesday, July 30, 1969

Erringer

R.E. Harrington was a pioneer who came to Simi Valley in 1907 and lived here the remainder of his life. He wrote one of the early history books about Simi Valley; <u>Early Days in Simi Valley</u>. He also wrote a column in the Enterprise Sun & News in the 1960s into 1970 called 'A Pioneer Speaks' that touched on many topics of interest regarding early Simi history. The article below takes you on a ride down what we now call Erringer Road as Mr. Harrington recounts the early pioneer families that settled along that thoroughfare.

Crossing our valley on what is now Erringer, we will start at the foothills on the north side and end at the foothills on the south side.

Havens Barn

At this time this was the settled portion of the valley, most of the ranches east of the Avenue, now called Blackstock, were in grain with very few settlers.


We will start with the ranch of C.A. Havens, the picture of the barn which accompanies this letter was that of C.A. Havens. His house has long ago been wrecked and I understand that the barn soon will be. (NOTE: This was near where 'Crunch Fitness' is now. Alamo did not go through to that location until the 1970s. The Havens barn was northeast of Erringer, where Alamo now runs.)

Havens was a cousin of Mr. Austin and associated with him is business in Chicago. He stayed behind Mr. Austin for about a year to settle up his business there and then came to Simi. Austin was so enthusiastic about the Simi Valley that he bought the Havens ranch for him even before Havens had ever seen it.

The Havens family consisted of 3 boys and 3 girls. They received their high school education in Ventura. Mrs. Havens was a cousin to John G. Rockefeller. Lester became our first rural mail carrier in 1908 and the family has been connected with our mail service ever since.

Coming further south we came to the house of Fred Bagnall. He lived in an adobe. (NOTE: This was roughly where the Holiday Inn Express Motel is now at 2550 Erringer). He married an Oxnard girl by the name of Lockridge and they had 3 beautiful daughters. I sprayed his apricot orchard in 1908. Fred carried the mail from the old Simi Land and Water Co. Hotel on horseback to the Simi post office. One of the girls had two suitors, one living close by and one coming in a car. To keep the one coming in a car away, sugar was put in his gas tank. Sugar clogged up his carburetor. He never came back. Mrs. Bagnall was very active in early church and kindergarten work.

Next we came to the C.G. Austin ranch on the west side of the street. Austin, whose picture we enclose, had a very gracious personality. He lived on the southeast corner of his ranch in a colony house and had about an acre of deliciously sweet navel oranges. (NOTE: The colony house was near where the Vons on Erringer and Cochran is **now)** He also had all kinds of new creations by Luther Burbank. Although he had no water, it was then virgin land, and everything seemed to prosper under his care. He was a veteran of the Civil War. He also was secretary of the Mutual Benefit Colony of Chicago.

His wife was an accomplished musician on the piano. She and my mother started a women's study club which was really the start of the Simi Valley Women's Club which was later affiliated with the national Association of Woman's Clubs.

The Austins had 3 children, Harry, Alice and Helen. When the Austins died, Harry took the west corner of the ranch and built the house where Lucille Estes now lives and the girls took the rest. Alice married Mr. Monroe and they went down to Palos Verdes on the Colorado to live and Helen married Knox Shirley. They adopted a daughter who later became a Wave.

We now come to what is now Cochran St. All of the land from Cochran to the Arroyo Simi belonged to Lewis M. Lloyd and west as far as the present Post Office (NOTE: This was the northwest corner of Los Angeles and Sinaloa). Mr. Lloyd didn't live permanently in our valley, but had his barns and corrals and a house on the north side of the street in old Simi. Andy Richardson lived in his house and kept house for Mr. Lloyd whenever he came to Simi.

In 1908 we pitted for the Montgomeries and it is probable that by that time Mr. Lloyd had given 40 acres or more to his daughter, Mrs. M.L. Montgomery. This Montgomeries built on this acreage a little later.

Havens took care of the old Lewis M. Lloyd ranch for 15 years. Quite a record. On the east side of what is now Erringer it is possible that Mr. Montgomery owned the land in 1907 upon which his son Wayne later built (NOTE: Now where the Methodist Church is on the southeast corner of Erringer and Cochran), but in 1907 it was mostly cactus and sage brush.

Crossing L.A. Ave., just as we reached the arroyo but before we crossed there was a hollow on the east side, just as there is now on the west side. In this hollow in a small whitewashed house and accompanied by a large whitewashed barn lived Henry Mahan. He farmed much if not all the Berylwood property. I understand that M.L. Montgomery had preceded him. Mr. Mahan had one daughter named Hazel. She was an expert horsewoman. Mahan was a graduate of U.S.C.

As we came up out of the Arroyo Simi on our right was the Parr place. Parr was a carpenter by trade. He married one of the Lang daughters. He had a large family, I believe 3 sons and 3 daughters. 2 of the boys live in Ventura. Joe is connected with the Sheriffs office and Bob has been in charge of the Ivy Lawn Cemetery. One of the daughters married Fred Fitzgerald and one a Mr. Michael and lives up near Modesto.

On our left we passed land belonging to John Scott (NOTE: The Scott/Cameron residence is still on the north side of Royal, just east of Erringer). He was an extremely honest man. He lost his wife just before we came down here. He had 2 daughters, Janet and Collie. Janet married Dougal Cameron and Collie married in Texas and went to live there. Janet died in an auto accident but

not before she wrote a fine book about Simi Valley. She also wrote a book about Moorpark. These books show remarkable research and talent and are a fine gift to posterity.

Beyond Camerons live the Chas. Richardsons. They had 2 sons and a daughter. They lived in a house built by our first Presbyterian Minister, a Mr. Warren. Their daughter Roxie became Mrs. James Strathearn and their son Sam I believe became a minister. Their oldest son Tom married Ollie Havens and they live in Santa Barbara.

A half mile beyond them lived some Spanish sheepmen. These men lived at the base of the hills surrounding our valley.

Thus we have crossed our valley from north to south on a street now called Erringer and told about each family then living along that route at that time.



An aerial photo from 1960. Erringer runs vertically just to the left of center.






A groovy time was had by all at the Simi Valley Historical Society's "Simi Valley Time Warp 1969" event on April 27!
