Mechanical Restoration

Well, I think summer has arrived in Simi Valley, daylight saving time gives us the opportunity to get started on those winter projects that did not reach completion. Our team of Volunteers continues to amaze me with their knowledge, skills, dedication to the cause, and their ongoing interests in Strathearn Historical Park and our collection of mechanical treasures.



I would like to share with you our most recent success story. The 1942 Farmall Model B refurbishment has been completed, and the tractor is ready for use. This was a 5 month project. We upgraded the Farmall by adding an electric starter, (no more hand cranking), replaced an incorrect carburetor, replaced the clutch assembly, changed the rear wheels and tires, rebuilt the radiator, added a kill switch, repaired the parking brake, upholstered and added a second seat for anyone wanting a tractor ride, cleaned, painted, and placed decals.



Next project is our completion of the 1929 John Deere D Tractor, this has been a 6 plus year project that was plagued by the difficulty of locating needed parts, remanufacturing obsolete items, and correcting many issues that were discovered when reassembly was started some months ago. Remaining challenges are minimal compared to

the hundreds of volunteer hours that have been spent to achieve this point of completion. The rest of the work needed on this project is cleaning and prep of all sheet metal and chassis parts, the painting of all components, the assembly of all sheet metal and other various items. Having a restored 1929 Tractor in our collection is quite an accomplishment, and a tribute to the original donor of the tractor, Mrs. Reba Hayes Jeffries. Thank you for the donation. I expect we will complete this project by the end of May, in time for this year's 'Moments in History' event on June 20th.

Waiting for refurbishment is our 1935 Caterpillar 22 Tractor. Preliminary work has begun on this item. One of our volunteers, Mr. John Manix who lives here in Simi Valley has many years of experience with Cat Tractors. We are so lucky to have him on our team.

The 1915 Ford Model T Touring Car is scheduled for minor repairs and a battery replacement in the next month or so, in time for our June 20th event.

A Tale of TWO Organs!

A big THANK YOU to the Gillibrand Family! Joan Gillibrand Gladwyn, with assistance from Leyland and Dale Gillibrand, has donated an organ that belonged to their family to the Simi Valley Historical Society! The Gillibrand family has been in Simi Valley since the early 1900s.

This 1886 Organ was also used in the St. Rose of Lima Church for a time. Juanita Gillibrand Brooks played this organ as a young girl in the St. Rose Church. We think



that the Gillibrand family lent their organ to St. Rose until the Church was able to purchase one of their own. After the Church purchased the Story and Clark pump organ (below), the Gillibrand organ returned to the Gillibrand house. The Story & Clark organ was donated to the Historical Society in memory of Grace Simmons. We would love to learn more and



determine the dates when each of the organs was in use by St. Rose Church. Can anyone help? Help us fill in the details in this 'Tale of Two Organs."

HELP our HISTORIAN

Our Historian, Pat Havens, is writing the story of the Tapo District. She is using the contents of the Tapo Mutual Water Company office. The Tapo Rancho was a portion of the north central El Rancho Simi. If you have information or photos to share, please get in touch!



In this thrilling installment of HISTORY POLICE we will continue to explore THE STREETS OF SIMI VALLEY.

ALAMO STREET was originally Palm Avenue or Drive. The row of palm trees were planted as the south border of the Patterson Ranch Company development c1913 according to Joe Schreiber, who worked for the Tapo Mutual Water Company from its beginning in 1918 until its closure c1967. There are more than 140 Washingtonia filifera palms along Alamo. A few of the trees were moved around the corner to Tapo Canyon Road during modernization/addition of the DMV, etc. Alamo does not mean palm in Spanish (it means poplar). "Palma" means palm. No one has a good reason for the name change.



APPLETON ROAD was named for the wagon road that ran south from Royal

Avenue to the John and Laura Appleton Ranch. Appleton came to Simi Valley in 1887 from Massachusetts and
purchased the 160 acre ranch in 1891 from Charles Hoar. The ranch was sold to developers in 1962 and the
Griffin Company built the Stonegate tract.

FITZGERALD ROAD runs west from Appleton Road to the Fred Fitzgerald ranch that was located where the present Hillside Junior High School is now situated.


INGRAM TRACT STREET NAMES: In the spring of 1947, a developer named Richard F. Ingram bought property from Pacific States Savings and Loan and placed it on the market. It was a chance for buyers to buy small acreage and build their own homes with several operating chicken/egg ranches in that area. PATRICIA STREET was named after the Ingram daughter. GALT, CHARLES, WILLIAMS and HUBBARD were named for early purchasers of the land.



PEPPERTREE LANE: Lined with pepper trees, this long straight road led from Los Angeles Avenue all the way south to the Eddie Maier Ranch. The square-shaped Maier House was built about 1912, around an atrium (the house no longer exists due to the 1994 earthquake). In the 1940s, the ranch was acquired by the Brandeis Institute, and eventually the adjacent Jim Arness ranch was donated to Brandeis also. When the road was improved to accommodate the burgeoning modern industrial complex, the pepper trees, said to be old and diseased, were removed. Tapo Canyon Road was finally extended across the railroad tracks, and aligned with the old Peppertree Lane in 1993, and the name Tapo Canyon superseded Peppertree Lane. Now "Peppertree

Lane" begins at the entrance to American Jewish University (Brandeis/Bardin Institute), and is still lined with its original, ancient pepper trees. There is also a short "Peppertree Lane" in Susana Knolls which goes west from the west loop of Katherine Road, just south of the railroad tracks not far from Black Canyon Road.

TIERRA RAJADA ROAD (with an "a") shows on the diseño (Spanish map) of El Rancho Simí. When it was changed to Tierra Rejada with an "e" is not known. Whether it is a corruption of "roja," and related to the red color of stones in the area, or to crack or fissure (canyon or valley?), as "rajar" means "to split, rend, crack," is not known. It was definitely named in early Spanish rancho days.
