A Great Loss for Our Community

Last month we lost a wonderful friend. With the loss of Bill Appleton, we lose a significant link to our past.

Bill's great-grandfather, J. S. Appleton came to Simi Valley in 1887 from Newburyport, Massachusetts. Appleton Road in Simi is named for the wagon road that ran south from Royal Avenue to the J.S. and Laura



Appleton Ranch, which was a 160 acre ranch they purchased in the late 1800s. J. S. Appleton is considered a pioneer, and was an amateur photographer who lived and farmed in Simi Valley for most of his life.

After J. S. Appleton's death, some 200 glass plate negatives of photographs he took in Simi during the early 1900s were found. Bill Appleton acquired these glass plate negatives, and worked to clean, preserve, research, print, and catalogue the images which are an invaluable glimpse into what is was like living in Simi Valley when it was a farming community.

Many of these photographs were used to illustrate Simi Valley -Journey Through Time, on which he also collaborated.

He was always working in some way to preserve the History of Simi, following in the footsteps of his mother, Hildie Appleton, who was a founding member of the Historical Society.

Bill will be missed for the wonderful person he was, and the many contributions he has made.

Mechanical Restoration

Here we are in the summer months with uncomfortable weather and sunshine everywhere. These conditions require some adjustments with our work habits and safety concerns while working in



the Stratheam workshop. These include hydration, rest periods, slower pace, and wearing hats when outside. Common sense goes a long way during the warm summer months.

Projects completed in 2015 include our 1929 John Deere Model D Farm Tractor, our 1942 Farmall Farm Tractor.



Next in line is our 1934 Cat 22 Crawler Tractor

that has been moved into our workshop and is up on blocks. This project is expected to take 24 months, if all goes well.



Our 1915 Ford Model T Touring Car needed some repairs to the fuel system and other minor corrections. Some work remains to complete these tasks. We are hoping to use the 1915 in this year's Simi Valley Days Parade.

We are planning to expand our workshop capabilities with upcoming donations of a Logan Metal lathe, and a small milling machine. This equipment will enable us to repair, replace, modify, and fabricate any special needed items for our refurbishment projects. We have a 220V AC/DC Welder, and could use a MIG Welder, and gas welding set up, maybe some one will donate these to our shop.

Future projects include a Model A Ford Engine/Air compressor combo, 1946 Chevy PU, 1926 Ford Model T, International Harvester T6 Crawler Tractor.

These projects need volunteers, so please join us on Monday mornings 8:30 AM to 12:00 Noon, and have some fun working on vintage equipment that is part of Strathearn Historical Park, and our Museum Collection of artifacts. You do not need to be a mechanic, just have a desire to help out and volunteer.

Moments in History at Strathearn Historical Park



In this exciting issue of **HISTORY POLICE** we will look at the four distinct communities that fused together to form what is now **SIMI VALLEY**.

When the valley was inhabited by the Chumash people there were three villages; Ta'apu, Shimiyi or Shimiji, and Quimisac.

When the Spanish land grant era began in the late 1700s, Simi was a part of the land grant given to Santiago Pico in 1795 known as "San José de Nuestra Señora de Altagracia y Simí."

The pioneers arrived in the late 1870s...and ever since, this has been 'The Valley of Simi.' BUT not all the communities in the valley were known as 'Simi.' There WAS the township of Simi (known as 'Simiopolis' for an unfortunate six month period in 1888, but then the name reverted to Simi Township). In the valley there were also the communities of Santa Susana, Community Center and the Susana Knolls (known first as Mortimer Park) at different points in time.



simi Township in the late 1800s the incorporation of Simi Land and Water Company came about. El Rancho Simi was divided into ranches and farms by that corporation, and advertised for sale to midwestern and New England states. An investor group, the California Mutual Benefit Colony of Chicago, purchased land and laid out a townsite (located between First and Fifth Streets and from Los Angeles south to Ventura Ave), named it 'Simiopolis' and shipped twelve pre-cut, partially assembled houses from a lumberyard in Chicago via rail to Saticoy, then brought by wagon to Simi. These are known as 'colony houses.' This was the first 'neighborhood' in Simi. Stores sprung up on Los Angeles Ave, and the first Simi School was built in 1890 on Third and California Streets.

SANTA SUSANA In 1903 the Santa Susana Train Depot was built, and the railroad was complete through Simi Valley, except for the tunnel, which was completed in 1904. A small business community grew up near the Santa Susana Train Depot, which was located on the north side of Los Angeles Ave, just east of Tapo Street. Over time residential developments followed and the town of Santa Susana was born. The Depot was moved in 1975 by Rancho Simi Recreation and Park District to its current location off of Kuehner.





COMMUNITY CENTER In 1922 L.F. Roussey laid out the small development which became known as Community Center. The driving force behind this development was the need for a High School in Simi, as well as a place to bring the elementary schools to one central location. The FIRST graduating class from the very first Simi High School was 1924, Simi Elementary was completed in 1926, The Methodist Church (which is now the Cultural Arts Center) was built in 1924. Numerous houses were built in Community Center in the 1920s and 1930s. The Simi Valley Women's Club was located there as well. It truly was a 'community center.'

1,800 acre parcel of land that was purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Lewis T. Mortimer in the early 1920s. They planned on selling the lots for cabins, or vacation homes. The lots, however, were very small (30 x 50 feet), and the Mortimers did not take the mountainous nature of the land into account, so quite often the lots were not buildable. Oftentimes several lots were needed to build structures. In 1944 the Garden Club, an active community organization in the area petitioned the county supervisors to change the name of Mortimer Park to the Susana Knolls.



The first attempt to incorporate the towns of Simi, the area known as Community Center (93065) and Santa Susana (93063) in 1966 was unsuccessful. The second attempt in 1969 was successful, with residents voting 6,454 to 3,685 in favor of incorporation. 59% of eligible voters turned out for this vote. Susana Knolls is an unincorporated area of the Valley. Voters also voted whether to call this newly incorporated city 'Santa Susana' or 'Simi Valley.' The name Simi Valley garnered 2,000 more votes than Santa Susana.... AND HERE WE ARE.
