

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
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## President's Message



## \$1 a mile to get a doctor

When we first came to the Simi Valley it was 30 miles to the nearest doctor who was Dr. Livingston of Oxnard. He charged \$30 for a house call, so few could afford to get sick. The roads were all dirt then and narrow and often muddy after a rain. Dr. Livingston bought one of the first cars made but his charge was still \$30. There were other doctors in Ventura.

When we were first married I was taken with a sharp pain—Like most young couples I felt that I couldn't afford a doctor's visit so I put it off. But the pain persisted so finally we called Dr. Livingston. He said that I had appendicitis but that the appendix had not broken into the blood stream and had passed off. But he advised that I should stay in bed and eat and drink nothing until the inflammation subsided and then come down to Oxnard and have the appendix removed. We had a hot east wind and his prescription was hard to follow, especially the drinking part. We did wash out my mouth, however. At Oxnard the first St. Johns Hospital had been built. It was a board and batten building, my nurse was Clara Donlon. The operation was not bad.

In 1916 my mother was taken with a severe heart ailment. A liquid accumulated around her heart. Again we called the doctor from Oxnard but he arrived too late and she passed away soon after he arrived.

The first real doctor was doctor Yoakum who settled in Moorpark about 1920. After that our \$30 visits ceased. This was about 12 years after we came here.

In 1926 a Dr. James Allen who had an office in Chatsworth opened an office in Santa Susana. He built what is now the front of the Winfield Lumber Plant. He was here only certain days of each week. He was an Osteopath as well as a surgeon. In 1939 he moved to the San Fernando Valley and a Dr. Price took over his practice. Dr. Price later moved his office to the Community Center. a few years later Dr. J.O. Jones took his place and in 1953 his business had increased to the point that he built the present Medical Center on the corner of Deodora and School Sts.

The picture is one of B. St. in Oxnard and was taken from the corner of 5<sup>th</sup> St. looking up B St. Dr. Livingston's office is about the fifth building up, the one with the little up stairs protruding window.

The rest of my letter will be about the present status of developments since writing some of my former letters. The Planning Commission hearing last week about the Indian Cave Park was not decisive, but the size of the park will probably be 25 acres or more. The old Douglas Welfare Park property has been sold and it is hoped that part of that property may be added to the Indian Cave Park but there is nothing definite as yet.

In my former letter about the 2 graduates from out first high school I have heard from Margaret Silva. She married a Mr. Klee and has 3 children. He oldest, a girl, is Supervisor of the Punch Division of a Jet Plant, her name is Marion Maberg. Her second child, a son, is foreman of a plant manufacturing airplane instruments and her youngest, a daughter, is now a housewife. She has a Bobby Sox team and also a Camp Fire Group. Margaret now has 6 grandchildren. She has recently lost her husband. Her brother, Seraphine, one of my former scouts, has a nice business in Woodland. He recently telephoned to me. Margaret has been with the Dept. of motor vehicles in Sacramento nearly all of her life and will soon retire and return to Simi to live.

In my letter about the old road crossing down back of our ranch it is likely that early stages passed over this road. The first road over the Pass was built in 1860 and stages to Santa Barbara came over it for about 10 years. There was a road house called Larry's at the foot of this side. Later stages chose to go via the Conejo and it worked a big hardship on the Simi Valley. When the Simi Land and Water Company was formed stages from San Fernando to their hotel were resumed, but they were privately operated by the company. That was in the year 1887 or '88.

It is now definite that the new owners of the Runkle Ranch will give about 10 acres around Elephant Rock for a park, but if they will give a piece which will tie existing and prospective parks together is still unknown.

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#### **Creepy Doll Twilight Tour**

Our newest incarnation of the Twilight Tour featuring Creepy Dolls was held on Saturday, October 1, 2022. We offered four tours to the public. Reservations for the tours sold out in 46 hours! Guests were escorted by volunteers to the Strathearn House, Haigh/Talley Colony House, Library and Wood Ranch Barn where docents presented the history of the building. Creepy dolls were featured in each building. The Wood Ranch Barn bays contained a variety of creepy doll vignettes curated by Carolyn Valdez. We also featured a Magic Lantern show presented by Matt Schnittker with authentic 19th century projector and glass plates. The Simi Store did a brisk business and refreshment were offered outside the Barber Shop. Thank you to our 20 volunteers that made this event a success.
